Gilles Fuchs, President of the ADIAF revealed the names of the four artists competing for the 19th edition of the Marcel Duchamp Prize on the 10th of January, 2019 at ARTCURIA. Selected by collectors from the ADIAF, the CENTRE POMPIDOU will be hosting a group exhibition of the artists, the private view being programmed for the 8<sup>th</sup> of October next. The international jury will convene and announce the laureate on the 14<sup>th</sup> of October, 2019.

## Éric BAUDELAIRE

French artist born in 1973 in Salt Lake City, United States Lives and works in Paris Represented by the galleries: Greta Meert, Brussels - Barbara Wien, Berlin - Juana de Aizpuru, Madrid

Through his films, this artist working with the image questions the sense of actions and fictions. His practice is based on research about contemporary history and, in particular, situations specific to war. His work is comprised of photographs, prints, performances, conferences and publications that he incorporates into installations around his films.

## Katinka BOCK

German artist born in 1976 in Frankfurt, Germany Lives and works in Paris and Berlin Represented by the galleries: Jocelyn Wolff, Paris and Meyer Riegger, Berlin/Karlsruhe

Living in France for many years, Katinka Bock came into the spotlight for her "avant-garde" sculptures when, in 2012, she received the 14<sup>th</sup> Prize of the Ricard Foundation in France and the Dorothea von Stetten Prize in Germany. Her sculptures, performances or installations are always the result of an experience connected to a specific place. This *in situ* research is formalized in simple and often, basic materials such as clay, sand, stone, chalk, wool and metal or even air and water.

## **Marguerite HUMEAU**

French artist born in 1986 in Cholet, France Lives and works in London Represented by the gallery: Clearing, Brussels

Myths, fantasies and speculations are at the heart of the work by this French artist living in London. Always situated on the boundaries between research and fiction, Marguerite Humeau's projects are the result of in-depth investigations and working collaborations with specialists and scientists.

## Ida TURSIC & Wilfried MILLE

Born in 1974, respectively in Belgrade, Serbia and Boulogne-sur-mer, France Live and work in Dijon Represented by the galleries: Almine Rech, Paris/Brussels/London/New York -Max Hetzler, Berlin - Alfonso Artiaco, Naples - Pietro Sparta, Chagny, France.

Since they met at the École des Beaux-Arts in Dijon and from the beginning of their communal work, the figurative paintings of Ida Tursic & Wilfried Mille question fantasy and reality, the visible and how it is depicted. These painters appropriate every iconographic genre (from landscape to portrait via pornography), coming and going between abstraction, figuration, op art, 3D painting, watercolour, oil, engraving and print.

#### THE ADIAF

Created in 2000 to highlight the creative energy of the artists on the French artistic scene, every year the Marcel Duchamp Prize honours a winner from among four French artists or artists residing in France, working in the field of the plastic and visual arts. The ambition of this collector's prize is to bring together the most innovative artists of their generation and help them develop their visibility in France and worldwide. Organized from the outset in partnership with the Centre Pompidou and endowed with the sum of 35 000 euros, it is considered to be one of the most relevant vectors of information about contemporary art in France today and one of the top benchmark national prizes worldwide. The four artists are selected by a committee of eleven collectors from the ADIAF, who are renewed each year. The laureate is chosen by an International jury of collectors and directors of major art institutions
